

MANSKER'S SECOND TRIAL.

The Third Olyphant Bandit on Trial His Second Time.

NEWPORT, February 3.—It was 3 o'clock this afternoon when the last man of the new jury in the second trial of Albert Mansker was accepted.

Dr. John B. Bond, Coroner of Pulaski County, was the first witness. He retold the evidence which has been seen in these dispatches during first trial. In cross-examination he said that he has had much experience in dealing with bullet wounds such as the one he had found in McNally's body. He served as surgeon in the Confederate Army four years. He is quite sure that the bullet wound caused McNally's death. The porter, engineer and fireman gave the history of the hold-up. Those three say that while standing at the express car door, waiting to have it opened, that all the robbers placed their guns to their shoulders and taking deliberate aim fired up towards the passenger coaches. Then it was that McNally was shot. But as the night was dark and the place where he stood was distant from them a car and a half, they did not see him. The court is holding a night session.
