Vernon Horn Allows Only Three Blows in Nightcap; Birds Muff Away Opener

Jack Bolling Plays Sensationally as Emergency Third-Base Man for New Orleans

Travelers' Field, Little Rock, Ark., June 3.—After miffing away the opening game, 9 to 8, the Pelicans came back on the three-hit pitching of Vernon Horn to win the second, 3 to 0, and break even in a doubleheader with the Travelers here tonight. The clubs also divided a pair Sunday.

While both clubs gave an exhibition of good, bad and mediocre baseball, it was Jack Bolling who thrilled the crowd. The left-handed Bird first-baseman played third base in an emergency and played sensationally, coming up with fine stops and good throws in both games. The alert Bolling never was caught napping and throwing from the left side from third seemed as natural to him as throwing from first.

Up to his old box juggling. Blades brought four pitchers to play in the sea-saw first game. They came and went in this order: Jurisch, Gabler, Varchol and Coffman. Varchol, who took over in the seventh, was yanked after pitching three balls to Joe Dwyer in the ninth. He was charged with the loss. 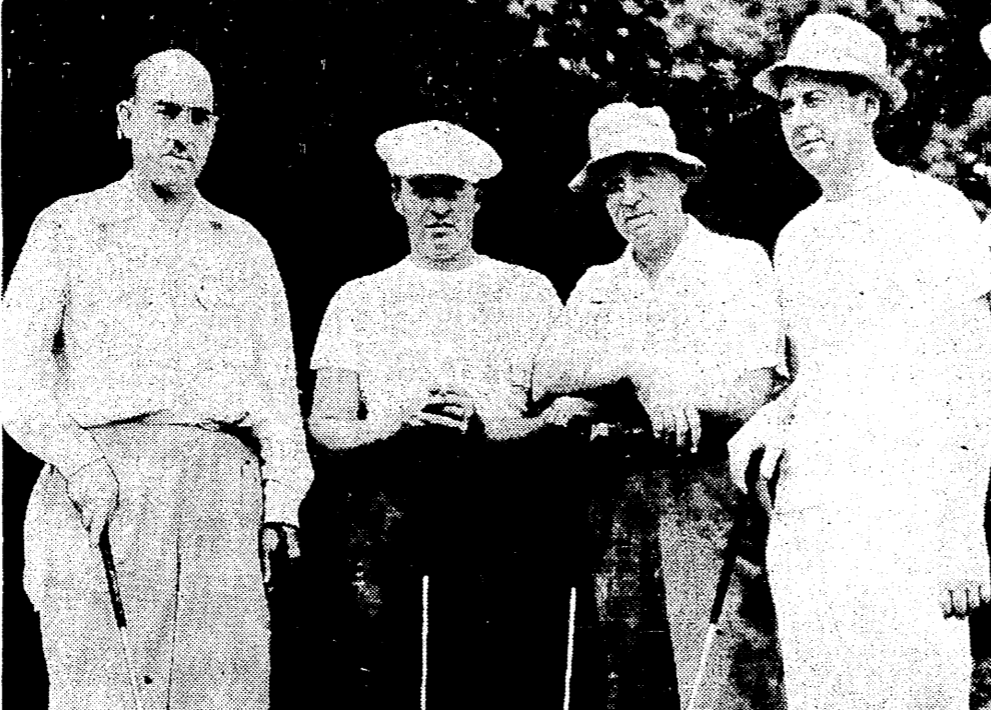

Bobby Jones Cards 72 Here En Route to National Open Golf Event at Fort Worth

Renews Old Rivalry With Nelson Whitney; Bob Definitely Retired from Major Competition

En route to Fort Worth, Tex., to see the national open golf tournament in his annual role as spectator, Bobby Jones, the greatest golfer of all time, stopped off between trains Tuesday to play a round of golf with his earliest major rival—Nelson Whitney—of the New Orleans Country Club.

Before a small "private" gallery, the grand slammer of 1930 gave his perfect swing a light workout as he toured the course in one over par—37-35—72. It was his first trip around the Country Club since he was beaten by Whitney, 6 and 5, in the semifinals of the Southern tournament in May, 1919.

Captain Mike O'Leary, long-time friend of Jones, and Judge Howard McCall, president of the Country Club, also played Tuesday's round, the pair scoring around 90.

Beaten by Fey—Jones, who has been beaten by few golfers since he began his brilliant career back around 1916, came to New Orleans as defending Southern champion in 1919 when he was only 17 years of age. Bobby was a big favorite to win again, but Whitney, the old master, was quite a shooter in those days himself, blasted Jones out of the semifinals, 6 and 5, after the first 18 holes of their 36-hole match all square. Nelson won the tournament, which was his sixth championship and the last he played in.
