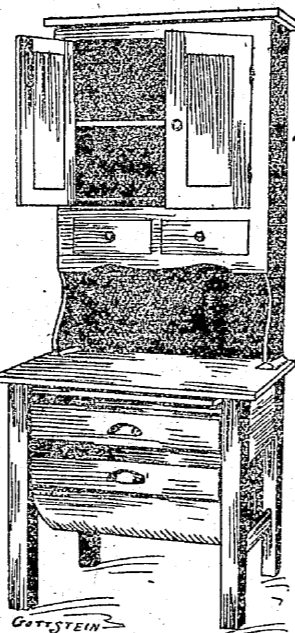

### COMMISSIONERS HEAR WATERWAY PROPOSALS

#### Decision Whether \$350,000 Harbor Bond Issue Shall Go to Duwamish District or to Several Reserved.

The board of county commissioners for two hours this morning listened to speeches for and against appropriating \$350,000 of the King County harbor bond issue, recently set aside for public docks, for the Duwamish project alone, excluding the Lake Washington canal, the Renton waterway. At the conclusion of the hearing the commissioners announced that they would reserve a decision.

### DEBATE ON QUESTION CONTINUES TWO HOURS

Frank Heman, W. E. Stillinger, A. B. Nevell and others, speaking against the petition of the Duwamish waterway commissioners, declared that the \$350,000 should be pro-rated as suggested by a majority of the port commission, \$187,500 to the Lake Washington canal, \$150,000 to the Duwamish and \$12,500 for the Renton waterway. These speakers devoted their time to the intent of the clause that was not the intent of the port commission. Robert Bridges, P. E. Purcell, J. S. Elliott and others favored the early completion of the Duwamish waterway.

### BIG INTEREST AROUSED IN CANAL CONFERENCE

New Seattle Chamber of Commerce to Hold Rousing Meeting on Friday Afternoon.

The widespread interest shown in the Northwest and coast in the location, in the subject of Panama Canal tolls is evidenced by the numerous responses which are coming in to the result of the invitation of Manager W. A. Meers of the transportation bureau to the chambers in this city for a conference in this city Friday on the subject. Meers has received assurances that good-sized delegations of representative citizens will be present from the chambers and Seattle, as well as Everett, Aberdeen, Hoquiam, Olympia, Port Townsend and Port Angeles. The discussion of this topic of vital importance to Puget Sound will take place at the assembly room of the new chamber at 11:30 o'clock Friday afternoon, and will be the first step in the movement of that organization to get action from Congress in the matter of the canal which will bring the greatest benefits to this coast. Among the speakers will be Mr. Meers, President D. E. Skinnard of the Port Blakely Mill Company, ex-Senator J. H. Wilson, Capt. James Fowler, Lloyd's surveyor, and Capt. Frank Walker.

### SMITH BUILDING STARTED

The task of tearing down the brick structure on the site of the L. C. Smith Building to be forty-two stories high and to cost \$1,500,000, was started this morning at the northeast corner of Second Avenue and Vesler Way and the erection of the fine skyscraper will be pushed forward as rapidly as possible. The contracts for the various portions of the immense block have been awarded for several weeks, and the starting of work was delayed until material and apparatus could be assembled.
