Funeral services will be held today for two young brothers—David, 3, and Virgil Brogdon Jr., 5—who were strangled May 2 in the Laguna mountains. The rites will be conducted at 1:30 p.m. in Greenwood Mortuary with burial in Greenwood Memorial Park. Jesse C. Canale, chief deputy coroner, said contributions received by his office to pay the funeral expenses will be returned to the senders. The mortuary is providing the services without cost, he added.

The two boys were brought to San Diego a few weeks ago by their mother, Mrs. Wanda Brogdon, and her friend, Kenneth Merriam. Merriam, who has admitted killing the children, and Mrs. Brogdon are being held on suspicion of murder. They will be given a sanity hearing Friday. The boys' father, Virgil Brogdon of Rockford, Ill., is here to attend service.

2 Patrolmen Win Degrees

Two San Diego police patrolmen will receive associate of arts degrees in police science from San Diego Junior College. They are Charles D. Crow, 26, of 3861 Armstrong St., and Carlos Gutierrez, 28, of 3636 Antiem Ave. They have been members of the San Diego Police Department since 1956. Kenneth D. Fawcett, coordinator of technical education, said 526 students are enrolled in the two-year program, offered since 1951. Classes are on the junior college's main campus, 1425 Russ Blvd.

Paul T. Mannen, fair manager, last month paid all the bills before the monthly board meeting in compliance with a 20-year board policy. Authorization of payment was withheld after Farb questioned the accounting procedures of fair officials.

DISCOUNT BILLS PAID

Yesterday Mannen told a reporter that this month he had paid only the monthly payroll and discount bills. He said he had left unpaid those bills which would not receive a discount if paid before May 10.

Mannen will resign effective Aug. 1 as district secretary-manager. He announced his intention last October.

The board approved a new policy to require two signatures on district checks. The policy was recommended by Lipton. Farb said adoption of such a policy was unnecessary because state law already requires two signers.

Under the policy the district manager's signature on a check must be accompanied by the signature of the board chairman or of the finance committee chairman.

COMMITTEE NAMED

Lipton also appointed an executive and legal committee to comply with district bylaws. It will be composed of Farb, chairman; Earl Roberts, of San Diego; and Harry Frame, of Poway.

A request to send a representative of the state attorney general's office to monthly board meetings apparently has been turned down. The board request followed several illegal actions earlier this year when the board tried to fire Mannen.
