Lutherans Moving Service Center

Selection of a new site for the Lutheran Service Center here will be announced in 20 to 30 days, the Rev. Fred T. Eggert, director, said yesterday. Lutheran churches of America have allotted \$100,000 for the facility.

The Rev. Carl W. Yaeger and the Rev. Walter E. Kraemer of Washington, D.C., Lutheran Service Commission secretaries, and the Rev. Henry Westby of Palm Springs, area director, will leave San Diego today for El Paso after studying possible local sites since Sunday.

The Lutheran Service Center, providing a canteen and hostess service for military personnel here since 1951, is at 1342 Second Ave. The building, not owned by the center, has been sold, the Rev. Eggert said.

He said another downtown site, "closer to the flow of military traffic," is under consideration.

Youth Jailed In Rioting

A youth accused of sparking a riot in the Logan Heights area June 13, in which a patrolman was stabbed, yesterday was given 30 days in jail.

Linzey Pierson, 18, of 127 N. 12th St., was found guilty by Municipal Court Judge Ronald Abernethy of resisting arrest. The judge sentenced Pierson to 90 days but suspended 60 days.

Police accused Pierson of leading a gang of over 100 youths, who threw stones at police called to quell a disturbance in the 3100 block of Valle avenue.

Before the crowd was broken up, Patrolman Larry L. Griffin was stabbed and Patrolman Hugh A. McKinzie was bitten. Griffin has recovered.

Imagine San Diego Without Hospitals

Imagine San Diego without Mercy Hospital. Or without Scripps Memorial or Sharp Memorial Community hospitals.

How would the community care for its sick, its medical emergencies?

This question was posed yesterday by Milton F. Fillius Jr., chairman of the campaign committee of the Tri-Hospital Building Fund.

He said the answer is that San Diego could not get along without these three non-profit private hospitals. And the answer demonstrates the need for supporting the 10½-million-dollar drive to provide 442 critically needed beds and other facilities at the three hospitals, he said.

OWNED BY CITIZENS

"These three hospitals are, in effect, owned by the citizens of San Diego and are operated without profit to serve the citizens of San Diego," Fillius said. "The only profit is made by the citizens of the community in the form of medical facilities that otherwise would not be available to them."

Fillius noted that the three hospitals were organized and are operated as non-profit institutions under federal, state and local laws.

"They can't make a profit or they would lose their tax exemptions," he observed. "Their financial statements are rigorously examined by government auditors."

Financial statements from the three hospitals show that in the last three years they

operated at a combined loss of \$594,829, he said. This consisted of an operating loss of \$9,658 and an additional loss of \$585,171 from bond requirements and capital improvements.

"Consider that these hospitals are losing money and then think about their service to the community," Fillius said.

"In the first place, they offer medical facilities to our citizens regardless of race, color or creed.

CITIES EQUIPMENT

"Then remember, these large and dedicated hospitals maintain a great deal of expensive equipment that smaller hospitals, operated for a profit, are not able to afford. Mercy, Scripps and Sharp receive many patients who could not be accommodated at other hospitals in the area."

"In addition these three hospitals care for many persons who are unable to pay. Last year, the three hospitals supplied care in excess of \$440,000 to such persons."

"San Diego could not get along without these institutions. They mean too much to the community."

Rainbow Water Work Resumes

Work on the Rainbow Municipal Water District's \$250,000 Moosa Canyon distribution line resumed yesterday under an order signed by Superior Court Judge William A. Glen.

A. M. McBride, general manager and chief engineer of the Rainbow district, said the 37,000-foot-long transmission line traverse a will portion of the district not now served with water.

The line will be connected to the second barrel of the San Diego County aqueduct and, through a loop connection to the first barrel, will equalize pressure for the entire district, McBride said.

Work on the line, suspended voluntarily June 25 when a taxpayers' injunction suit was filed, was resumed on advice of the Rainbow district's attorneys, Clinton F. Jones and Michael C. Mealey of Escondido.

Glen's order, filed with the county clerk, denied a petition for a preliminary injunction and restraining order sought by the taxpayers' suit brought by Virgil Hutton and Edward Keeler, directors of the Bonsall Heights Water District.

McBride said the Bonsall Heights district is contained wholly within and buys its water from Rainbow.

In addition to the Rainbow district, the suit to permanently enjoin construction of the line was brought against

the contractor, the Bejac Construction Co. Hutton and Keeler argued in their suit that the contract was let illegally because only three of the district's five authorized directors were present at the contract meetings. Of these, two directors voted for the contract.

Glen's decision agreed with the arguments of Jones and Mealey that the fact three directors were present constituted a legal quorum.

McBride said that barring further delay the line will be completed in mid-August. He said it will serve areas for which subdividing is contemplated.

Files Water Suit

VISTA—The Vista Sanitation District yesterday brought suit in Superior Court to enjoin a couple from allegedly damming Buena Vista Creek.

Named as defendants in the action are Harry W. and Viola M. Johnson of Route 3, Box 703, Vista.

The district's suit claims the Johnsons changed the flow of the creek, causing it to flood district property and threaten earthen berms which contain two oxidation ponds for treatment of sewage.

Johnson earlier brought suits against the county for \$4,499 damages on an allegation that grading work caused the creek to overflow and damage his property. Trial of this action is pending.

Tobias Jurors Deliberate Fate In Bar Slaying

A jury of six women and six men began deliberation yesterday after a week-long trial of Bayani Fernando Tobias, 25, accused of murder and assault with a deadly weapon. The jurors were locked up for the night at 10:15 after deliberating four hours.

Superior Court Judge Edgar B. Hervey instructed the jurors after closing arguments by Deputy Dist. Atty. Robert J. Stahl and Tobias' attorney, Arthur A. Lennard.

Tobias is charged with fatally shooting a bakery driver, Ralph Mansker, 36, and wounding Charles Darrell Swiney, a driver's helper, at the Log Hut bar May 11.

RETURNED WITH GUN

The shooting occurred after Tobias had a quarrel with a girl, Aileen N. Kahomoku, 28, with whom he had been living. Witnesses testified he was forced to leave the bar. He returned after 20 minutes with a foreign-made revolver with which he allegedly shot Mansker and Swiney.

Stahl said testimony proved Tobias caught Swiney and Mansker off guard by apologizing to them outside the bar for his conduct earlier in the evening. When the two men turned to reenter the bar, Tobias opened fire.

Tobias claimed the shooting resulted after he was attacked outside the bar by Mansker and Swiney and that it was an act of self-defense. Lennard asked for an acquittal.

ASKS MURDER VERDICT

Stahl argued that there was premeditation and malice involved and therefore urged the jurors to return a verdict of murder in the first degree.

Tobias, a sailor of the submarine tender Nereus, testified he was featherweight boxing champion of the Philippine Islands before he entered the Navy in 1956.

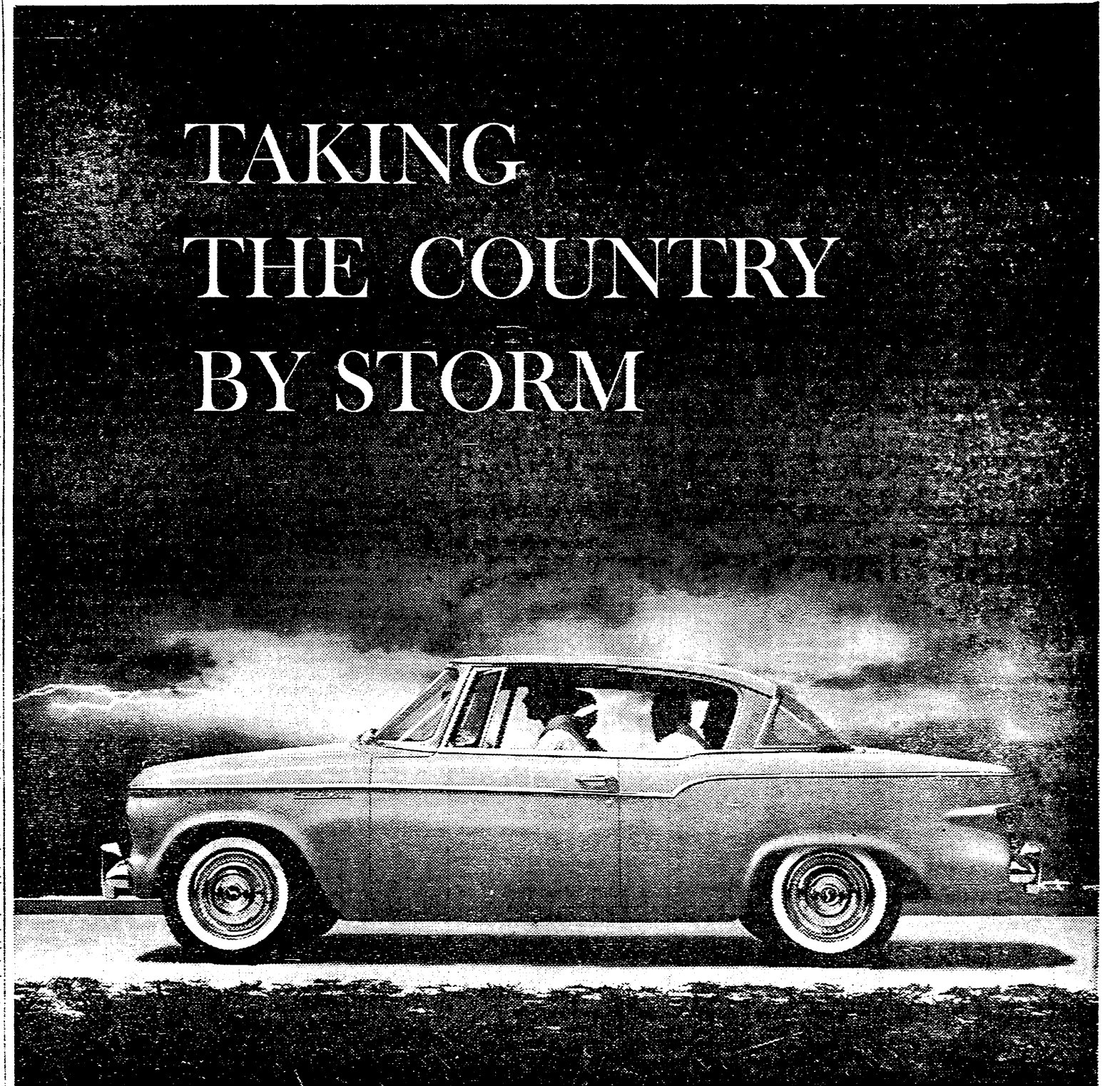
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
