ONLY WOMAN IN PORTUGAL SENATE VISITS HERE

THE only woman member of Portugal's Senate, Miss Maria Joana Mendes-Leal, arrived in Seattle yesterday in the last car of a train.

In picturesque French, through an interpreter, she described the country flying away from her as being similar to experiences with organizations and agencies visited in the United States. She is here on a leaders' grant from the International Educational Exchange Service, Department of State.

"Although the things I am learning are behind me," she said, "like the dawn, each day and its new experience bring another aspect. I will be able to go back and give some of our services a new touch. Agencies are like paintings. Simply by adding a touch, the whole picture is changed."

Miss Mendes-Leal represents private welfare organizations in Portugal's equivalent of our Senate, the Camera Corporativa. So she is particularly interested in similar organizations in this country. When she was invited to make this trip, she was allowed to see what interested her most.

"I knew this country was big and interesting so I chose activities closest to those which occupy me in Portugal," she said. She is national president of the International Council of Young Working Girls, is a voting member of the National

Council of Education of the Ministry of Education and its director of the Portugal Youth Organization for Teen-Age Girls.

She spoke yesterday of the Feminine Portuguese Youth, which she termed the most important organization in her country. This group includes pupils and students from grade-school to high-school and university age.

"The aim of the group is the formation of young girls from all points of view, including character, physical capacity, dancing, sports, preparation for family life and social activities," she explained. "The feminine work includes artistic

endeavors, such as modeling and crafts. Girls attend holiday camps subsidized by the government and have their own magazines."

Her charitable work is primarily with women's organizations, but she has no problems working with fellow members of the Senate. She does her part on committees, makes recreation and social-work reports and once wrote a "bill."

"Formerly young Portuguese girls who didn't have to work, didn't," she explained. "Today things have changed. Young women from good and wealthy families have professions. There are even a few engineers. Women are represented in de-

partments and ministries, but especially on faculties.

"Working is no longer a question of need, but has wide prestige. Portuguese women like to make themselves useful and respected, even without academic backgrounds. They feel they are working for the common welfare of the people."

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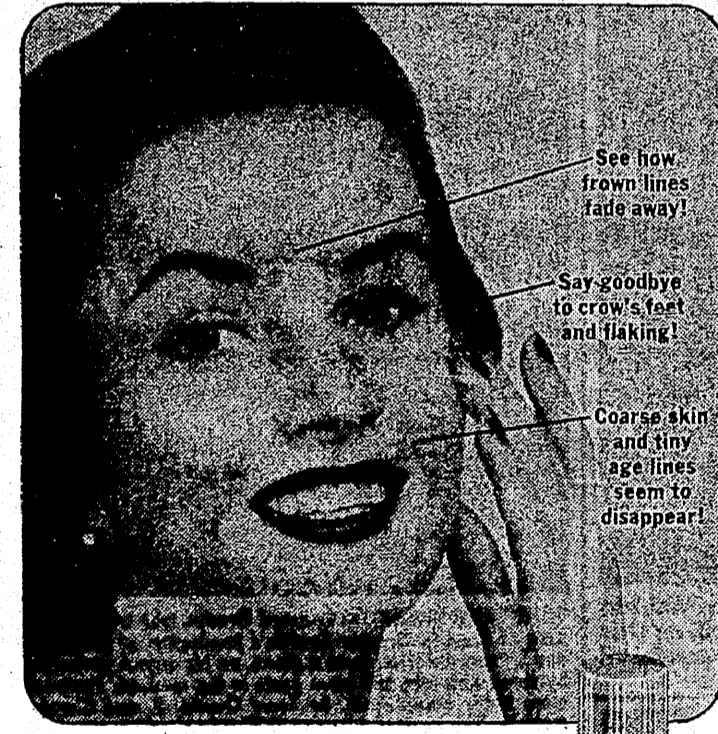
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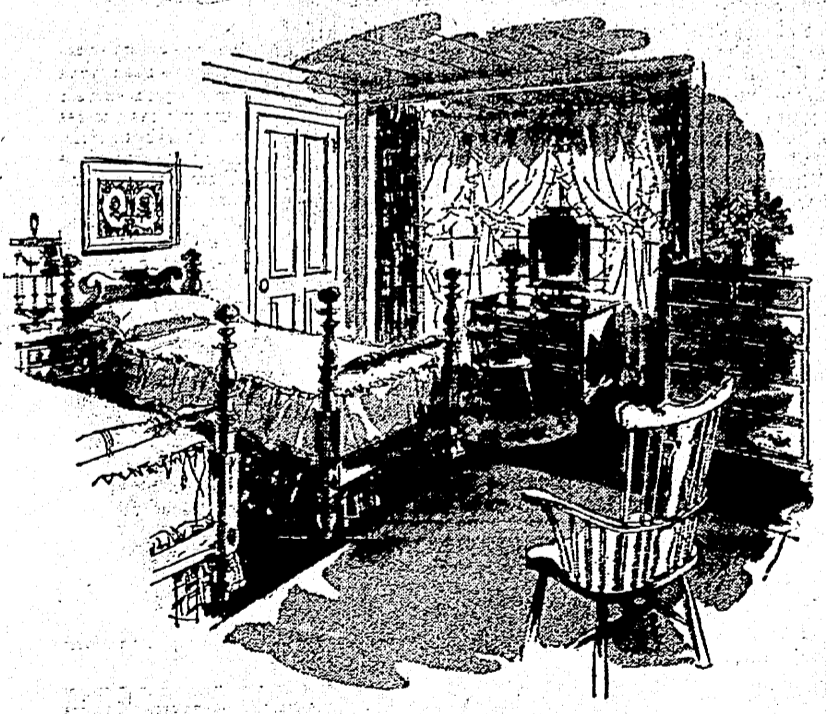
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
