Virginia Papers For Newton Baker For Presidency

RICHMOND, Va., Dec. 17.—(A.P.)—The Richmond News-Leader today said its editorial statement that Newton D. Baker, former secretary of war, is pre-eminently fitted for the office of president and should be drafted as a candidate, had drawn widespread and favorable reaction.

The News-Leader quoted Senator Glass' paper, the Lynchburg Advance, as saying "the Advance sincerely hopes that he will heed the voice of thousands of democrats and permit his friends to wage an active campaign in his behalf."

Norfolk Virginian-Pilot comment quoted was that the paper "would like to see Mr. Baker essay such a role with the democratic party behind him, but its faith in the party's readiness to risk any announcing not dictated by the crude question of ability to capture a majority in the electoral college is weak. The Norfolk paper said there were formidable obstacles to nomination.
