

TAMPA GIRLS TO COMPETE TODAY IN BEAUTY REVUE

15 Enter Contest for "Miss Tampa"

Fifteen Tampa girls will parade the patio of the Davis Islands swimming pool this afternoon to compete in the first elimination bathing beauty contest, sponsored by the junior chamber of commerce to select the city's representative in the state-wide finals, which will be held in Miami next Saturday. The winner of the state contest will represent Florida in the national contest, also scheduled for Miami early in March.

Judging in this afternoon's elimination will be in the hands of a visiting chamber of commerce executives, who will spend the day in Tampa as the guests of the local organization. The contest will begin promptly at 2:30 o'clock and the girls have been requested to report at the pool not later than 2 o'clock to receive their badges.

Five To Enter Finals

Five girls will survive the first elimination and will appear on the Victory theater stage Monday night between the 7 and 9 o'clock shows for final judging to pick "Miss Tampa." Prizes will be awarded the five finalists. Entrants, however, will be received up to half an hour before the opening of the bathing beauty parade.

The usual program of beauty contests will be followed at the Davis Islands elimination. Danny Haselmire and his orchestra have donated their services to play during the parade and judging. The pool will be decorated for the occasion and, with rising temperature forecast, junior chamber of commerce officials expect a large crowd.

Qualifications for contestants stipulate that the girls must be between the ages of 16 and 25 years. Professionals are barred and the judging will be based on the beauty of the entrant and the artistic design of her costume. The costume, however, is of lesser importance.

One of the entrants, Miss Ruby Johns of 327 West Azalea street, will be unable to compete, because of injuries received in an automobile last Tuesday night.

Care has been taken in assembling judges for the events to avoid any criticism of favoritism. The visiting chamber of commerce judges do not know any of the girls competing this afternoon and the five finalists will be judged Monday night by a committee picked from tourists.

Negro Is Convicted of Resisting Fly Guards

EXPLAINS \$25,000 SUIT

Dr. L. J. Eftird, one of those named in eight suits filed Thursday by the National City bank for a total of \$131,000, said yesterday the suit against him for \$25,000, was to collect money loaned to the Floridian hotel at the time it was organized and built. He said he was one of 11 endorsers on Florida notes and already had paid his pro rata share. A balance of \$15,000, still due, he said, does not represent one cent of borrowed money, but is money loaned on the hotel building project.

PINELLAS PAYS COUNTY \$4415 TO FINISH DEBT

Settles Bill Incurred by Division of Area

Pinellas county, formed from the west end of Hillsborough, Jan. 1, 1912, under an act of the preceding legislature, yesterday made final payment to Hillsborough of its proportionate share of bonded indebtedness outstanding in the original county at the time of division.

Upon demand of Sutton, Tillman & Reeves, county attorneys for Hillsborough, the Pinellas county commission turned over a check for \$4415.29 to the Hillsborough commission. It was the last payment on an aggregate debt of \$54,785.11, representing Pinellas county's share of highway, courthouse and other bonds, plus interest named in the bonds.

Legislature Fixes Debt

The requirement of Pinellas county paying its part of the bonded indebtedness of original Hillsborough was fixed by the same legislative act under which Pinellas was created. The payment yesterday, with \$4000 paid last Aug. 7, was the first since 1925, Pinellas county officials in that year maintaining it had paid all it owed Hillsborough. The Hillsborough attorneys, however, convinced them to the contrary, and showed in so many figures that the account lacked \$8415.29 of full payment. Upon this showing, the Pinellas officials decided to pay up and get a clean slate from the old debt.

In 1914 the amount of Pinellas county's part of the indebtedness then current was fixed at a conference of officials of the two counties. However, Pinellas' responsibility extended to other indebtedness becoming due in subsequent years, and as this indebtedness accumulated Hillsborough called upon Pinellas to pay it.

Future Farmers To Hold Contest in Judging at Fair

Boys comprising the organization of Future Farmers of Florida, representing chapters from Tallahassee to Miami, will gather here Feb. 1 to hold a judging contest at the South Florida fair.

The program calls for the judging of three classes of fruit and vegetables, three of livestock and three of poultry. The judging will begin at 8:30 in the morning and continue for four and a half hours.

Prizes will be awarded to the winners in the judging contests. The school winning the highest number of prizes will be awarded a silver loving cup.

The annual banquet of the organization will be held at the Hillsboro hotel the night of Feb. 1. In addition to members, leading officials and citizens of several counties will attend, and a series of short addresses will be given. Prizes in the judging contests also will be awarded at that time.

Special Recital To Be Given on Carillon Today
