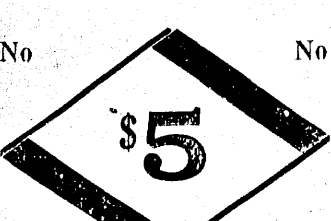

Halloween Spirit To Pervade Tampa As Many Celebrate

Tonight is Halloween. It is a time dear to the heart of small boys who like to slip about on mysterious errands of mischief. It will be celebrated in dozens of places with weird costumes and pranks of all sorts. The night will be dedicated to witches and goblins. Black cats and spooky lanterns will be in evidence and all manner of deprecations will be forgiven in the name of Halloween.

Broken mirrors will take on an unusual significance, and there will be messages of love and of the future in tea leaves. Black cats will be supposed to take on devilish shapes and if one looks closely he may see wizened old witches fluttering about the sky on broomsticks.

Griming jack-o-lanterns will peep from darkened corners. There will be strange and uncanny noises. Mothers have been busy for a week on yellow and black costumes which most of the ghosts will wear, and these will be paraded at nightfall at five city playgrounds. In addition, numbers of organizations are planning parties at which members will don funny hats, throw serpentine and have a general good time.

What a change from the original conception of the day. As is the case with so many festival days, Halloween originated in the early Christian church. The word means "holy eve," and is the eve of All Saints day, the day set apart by the church to commemorate the lives of those who have gone before. It was thought that the spirits of the departed returned to earth on that evening, and many were the ceremonies devised in their honor. Most of the modern Halloween customs are outgrowths of those early Christian ceremonies.

"All saints—the unknown good who rest In God's still memory folded deep. The bravely dumb, who did their deed, And scorned to blot it with a name, Men of the plain, heroic breed That loved Heaven's silence more than fame."
