JURY FINDS RECORDS LACKING IN IMPERIAL SCHOOL INQUIRY

EL CENTRO, June 24 (Special)—Imperial county high schools received from the state \$52,424 and from the county \$322,602.78, or a total of \$375,026.78, according to the preliminary grand jury report which has been filed with the county clerk. The elementary schools, according to the report, received \$557,292.20 from the state and county for the year ending June 30, 1929.

The report shows that the cost of conducting the elementary schools for the fiscal year mentioned was \$627,530.74, and for the high schools \$508,323.64. This made a per capita expense of \$102.70 for each of the elementary school pupils, and \$344.15 for each of the high school pupils. High school teachers during that fiscal year received \$247,036.60. The cost of maintaining high school buildings and grounds and school busses, including the purchase of some equipment, was \$29,929.85.

The report shows that the county high school districts retired bonds to the value of \$49,500, leaving \$697,000 in bonds outstanding. Elementary school teachers received salaries of \$458,177.13. Transportation of pupils in the elementary districts cost the taxpayers \$29,143.12. The elementary school bonds outstanding amounted to \$1,029,100, \$64,200 in bonds having been retired during the year.

A deplorable lack of records and information covering the transactions of the school bonds in some of the small elementary districts was reported by the grand jury. Quoting the auditors employed by the grand jury, the report says that in some instances the minute books of the school board recorded only one or two meetings of the boards during the year, and these contained virtually no information relative to the business transactions. In the Mt. Signal school district the report says that the auditor found no records had been maintained covering the business transactions of the school board during the last 18 years.

The grand jury report criticizes other school districts in their methods of keeping track of business transactions and says: "Summing up the result of our investigation of the affairs of the school districts herein mentioned, I believe the lack of business management, the chaotic condition of accounting records wherein such records exist at all, and the fact that no information presenting a history of the operation and financial affairs of the district, amenable to intelligent audit, is available, is worthy of severe criticism."

It is recommended in the grand jury report that minute books of all official business be kept by the several boards of school trustees and that money should not be expended unless it is for the direct benefit of the pupils and the schools generally.

BURY VETERAN, VICTIM ANSONIA, Conn., June 24 (A.P.)—Full military honors today were accorded Raymond C. Spang as the decorated World War veteran was buried in St. Peter's cemetery with his wife and four children, whom he flung to their deaths from the summit of West Rock, New Haven, Saturday before ending his own life with a suicidal leap.

Preble is now supervisor, having been appointed by Governor Young to fill a vacancy when Ben Hulse resigned.

SUNDAY CLOSING LAW FACES TEST

Five Merchants Appear in Court at El Centro for Alleged Ordinance Violation.

EL CENTRO, June 24 (Special)—This city's Sunday closing ordinance is to be enforced to the letter, according to Chief of Police Frank McCaslin, who ordered the arrest of several merchants for operating their business houses openly last Sunday. Five appeared in police court today and their cases were continued until tomorrow for further investigation.

An ordinance was adopted by the council June 9, 1924, prohibiting the sale of certain kinds of merchandise on Sunday. The ordinance makes an exception of garages, gasoline service stations, creameries, bakeries, ice cream parlors, cigar and news stands, confectionery stores, soft drink stands, soda stands, restaurants, pool rooms, theatres, drug stores and all other places of "public necessity, charge or legitimate public recreation."

Merchants who are charged with having violated the ordinance assert that the act discriminates in favor of certain lines of business and against other lines. It is considered possible that the constitutionality of the ordinance may be tested out by the accused men in superior court.

OFFICIALS JOIN IN DEATH QUIZ

District Attorney and Sheriff To Aid Coroner in Case of Carlsbad Woman.

The district attorney and sheriff yesterday joined with Coroner Schuyler C. Kelly in a searching investigation into the death of Mrs. Marie Cordero, 25-year-old Carlsbad woman. The young woman died suddenly Saturday night, and after Dr. P. G. Metz had refused to sign a death certificate because he was not certain of the cause of death, an autopsy showed presence of poison in the stomach. Ant poison containing the same drug was found in the Coroner's home. Pending investigation, the date of the inquest has not been announced.

TEACHERS GIVEN LIFE DIPLOMAS

Seven San Diego teachers, who have served satisfactorily in public schools for about five years, have been honored with California life diplomas, allowing them to teach in this state for life without further qualification. Miss Ada York, county superintendent of schools, announced yesterday.

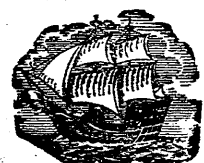
