GROUCHY SPEAKING suggestion that an "all-Louisiana Olympic squad homecoming" celebration be held for the Pelican state athletes here on Thanksgiving day in conjunction with the Tulane-L. S. U. football game is made by Alex Grouchy, former mayor of this city. He writes: "A crowd of 25,000 Louisianians will attend the Thanksgiving day L. S. U.-Tulane football game. Most of the Louisiana Olympic heroes have returned and have been feted by their home communities. But why not an 'all-Louisiana Olympic squad homecoming' at which this great assembly could pay honor and homage to all of our boys and girls in a fitting celebration which can be made distinctive and yet general in scope? "This suggestion is thoroughly feasible financially as the expenses could be absorbed by adding 10 cents to the price of admission—which everyone would gladly 'put in.' From this charge could be realized a sum sufficient to provide suitable trophies. "The ceremonies could be as spectacular as desired. I would like to witness the utilization of the period between the halves for the occasion and would get a thrill out of a program about as follows: Teams off the field. Great blare of trumpets. L. S. U. band marches on field followed by small military squad and Tulane band. A guard of honor escort for the full Louisiana Olympic squad which would march to the center of the field where Governor Allen, President Smith and President Dinwiddie and any other college president who has entries in the squad would receive them amid a military salute. The L. S. U. and Tulane bands would then merge and render the Alma Mater of each university. Another great blare of trumpets, music and the principals march off the field. "Snappy, unique and a proper testimonial of Thanksgiving to our boys and girls who brought such glory to Louisiana. "The writer considers the plan as a whole good, but doubts seriously if it could be put over simply because it calls for plenty of work and despite the times people don't like to work for practice. Another drawback is that at least two of the Olympic athletes, Glen Hardin of Old Lou, and Doyliss Hill of Tulane, will be on the football squads and therefore couldn't very well gather with the Olympic squad. And collecting the money to be used to purchase trophies would have to be done sometime in advance of the game unless some kind hearted soul would advance the spondulix. "Those are merely minor defects and the plan on the whole is good—except that it will require work. The co-operation of the leading newspapers of the state would be needed, but the writer is confident they would support a movement of this kind. Papooses Open Drive for Western Title

New Orleans Legion Club Meets Minneapolis Outfit in Opener, Eastern Tourney Also Underway

Omaha, Aug. 23. (AP)—The business of selecting an all-western representative for the finals in the annual Junior American Legion baseball tournament will get under way here today, with teams representing New Orleans and Minneapolis meeting in the opening game. Each of the six teams which will compete in the regional tourney here represents a champion of four states. Seattle and Salina, Kan., will also meet tomorrow. Los Angeles and Boulder, Colo., drew byes in the opening round and will meet Wednesday in a semi-final contest. The two winners of the Tuesday games will be the other semi-final contestants Wednesday. Paps Get Workout. Omaha, Neb., Aug. 23.—The Papooses of New Orleans drew the team from Minneapolis, Minn., as their opponents in the opening game of the American Legion Western United States Junior baseball championship series starting here this afternoon at 1 o'clock. At the drawing held last night Jimmy Fraiche, captain of the Papooses team, made the first pick out of the hat and his choice was for the first game Tuesday. The Papooses, as well as the five other teams entered, were hoping for a bye in the first day, but true to the form of other years the New Orleans entry didn't get the break. Salina, Kans., and Seattle, Wash., drew for the second game today, starting approximately at 3:30 o'clock. Los Angeles, Cal., and Boulder, Colo., drew the byes. The winners of today's games will meet in the second game of a doubleheader Wednesday. The teams that drew byes will play the first game Wednesday at 1 o'clock. Captain Fraiche tossed up with Dennis Gleason, captain and catcher of the Minneapolis team for first or last inning and again the break went against the Papooses and they were forced to take first inning. In tossing for the dugouts, Fraiche got what he didn't want again when he was obliged to take the third-base line dugout. Though they didn't get the bye they hoped for, the Papooses figure to have a good time. They will play when they drew the first game and not the second. If the Papooses win on each of the coming three days they will be following exactly in the footsteps of the Sizeliers of 1930 and the White Sox of 1929, both of which went to the finals of the American Legion competition. The Minneapolis team that the Orleansians drew isn't any set-up, judging from its record. Donnie Anderson, right-hander who will face them today, boasts a record of eight victories without a defeat in league baseball this year. One of his feats is a one-hit game against a team from Malaca Minn. Doug Smith is utility hurler and considered a fine one, too. Dennis Gleason, lanky catcher who weighs around 200 pounds and looks fast, is the opposition's star batter and clean-up hitter. He is reputed to have gotten a hit in every game he has played so far. As a whole, the Minneapolis team is said to be a hard-hitting outfit. They will line up with the following batting order against the Papooses: Richard Ryan, first base; Edward Subject, shortstop; Donald Griffin, pitcher; Dennis Gleason, catcher; Laurence Reak, center field; Carl Gruidl, second base; Hugo Klars, left field; Darwin Henry, right field, and Bernard Reak, third base. Mike Donohue, former major league ball player and umpire and now umpire in the International league, will be the balls and strikes official in this series. Upon arriving at 2:30 yesterday the Papooses went right to the home field of the Omaha Western League baseball club. The boys had been dressed in their uniforms since yesterday morning, when they had a short practice on a field in St. Joseph, Mo., between trains. The team's special car was delayed 3 1/2 hours at St. Joseph and that was plenty of time to get in the practice. The two workouts served to iron out all kinks from the long journey and all the boys are well and ready for action. Easterners Battle. Gastonia, N. C., Aug. 23. Chattanooga Has Memphis Club on the Spot in Southern Flag Race After Success in Series

Memphis, Aug. 23. (UP)—The Chattanooga Lookouts are looking out for their lead in the Southern association baseball pennant race, and today enjoyed a margin of one and one-half games over the second-place Memphis Chicks, whom they licked Monday, 8-7, for three out of four in the series. Pettit, DeBerry and McCall of the Chattanooga hurling staff bested Walter Beck, who is headed for the majors, and Griffin in a heavy slugger game the Lookouts collecting 15 hits. Memphis in a heavy run which broke the tie and gave Chattanooga a victory came in the seventh on a brace of hits and a triple. Nashville, in third place, it was all about today. The Lookouts took a game yesterday, 8 to 7, thereby claiming three out of four contests they played here with the Chicks—the last time the two teams will meet this season. Coming here a point behind the Chicks, the visitors left for Little Rock last night with a percentage of .648. Memphis stood at .634 and faced seven games in four days with Nashville. The Lookouts took an early lead yesterday when they pounded Griffin for five runs in the third inning. Memphis immediately began a rally and continued the threat until the eighth inning but was unable to advance. DeBerry held the Chicks back until the fifth when they pounded him for four runs in that frame and he was withdrawn. Two five hit games were pitched in the Piedmont league last night. Wilmington defeated Raleigh 3 to 1 as Hardin led the Capitals down with five bingles. Petty, Raleigh hurler, allowed only six. GHNOULY DEFEATS DAVEY ABAD LAST NIGHT AT ORLEANS Meets Battling Shaw Next Monday for Bout With Welter Champ. New Orleans, Aug. 23 (UP)—Joe Ghnoully of St. Louis, defeated Davey Abad, of Panama, in a 10-round bout at the New Orleans Coliseum last night, the second of a series of elimination matches to select an opponent for Johnny Jadick, junior welterweight champion, in a titit bout here next month. The referee's decision for Ghnoully found disapproval among 2,000 fans who saw the fight, many contending the bout should have been declared a draw. Abad held the edge during the early rounds of the fight and then took a severe lacing from the Missouri boxer during the last three rounds. Ghnoully will meet Battling Shaw of Mexico next Monday night in a 10-round bout, the winner of which will meet Jadick.
