

MANSKER'S SECOND TRIAL.

A Jury Secured and the Hearing of Testimony Begun.

Newport, Ark., Feb. 2.—It was 3 o'clock this afternoon when the last man of the new jury in the second trial of Albert Mansker was accepted. Dr. John H. Bond, Coroner of Polaski County, was the first witness. He retold the evidence, which has been sent in these dispatches during the first trial. On cross examination he said that he had had much experience in wounds such as the one he found in McNalley's body. He served as surgeon in the Confederate Army four years. He is quite sure that the bullet wound caused McNalley's death. The porter, engineer and fireman gave the history of the hold-up. These three say that while standing at the express car door, waiting to have it opened, all the robbers placed their guns to their shoulders and, taking deliberate aim, fired up towards the passenger coaches. Then it was that McNalley was shot. But as the night was dark and the place where he was shot was distant from them a car and a half, they did not see him. The court is holding a night session.
