

OVER 1,000 WERE BURIED AT PECOS, NUSBAUM STATES

Ancient Church, Now Being
Excavated, Scene of Many
Interments; Valuable Relics
Are Uncovered.

Santa Fe, Aug. 16.—More than a thousand burials were made within the church or close to its walls at Pecos Pueblo, according to Jesse Nusbaum, of the museum, who came into town over Sunday. The damage caused by the caving in of part of a wall is not great, but the men and Nusbaum had only thirty seconds to get out of the way of the crashing tons of abode which broke into splinters big pillars. Nusbaum has uncovered the altar steps at the mission church and is making good progress in strengthening the huge foundations. In one coffin taken out, the skeleton remains of two girls were found. Dr. A. V. Kidder in charge of the excavations, is uncovering the third story of the pueblo toward the east. In the corner of a room a complete pottery-making outfit was found. Around one skeleton was a double pendant of more than a hundred pieces of turquoise set in mosaics. In a small ruin across the arroyo, a number of fine bowls of very ancient make were taken out.
