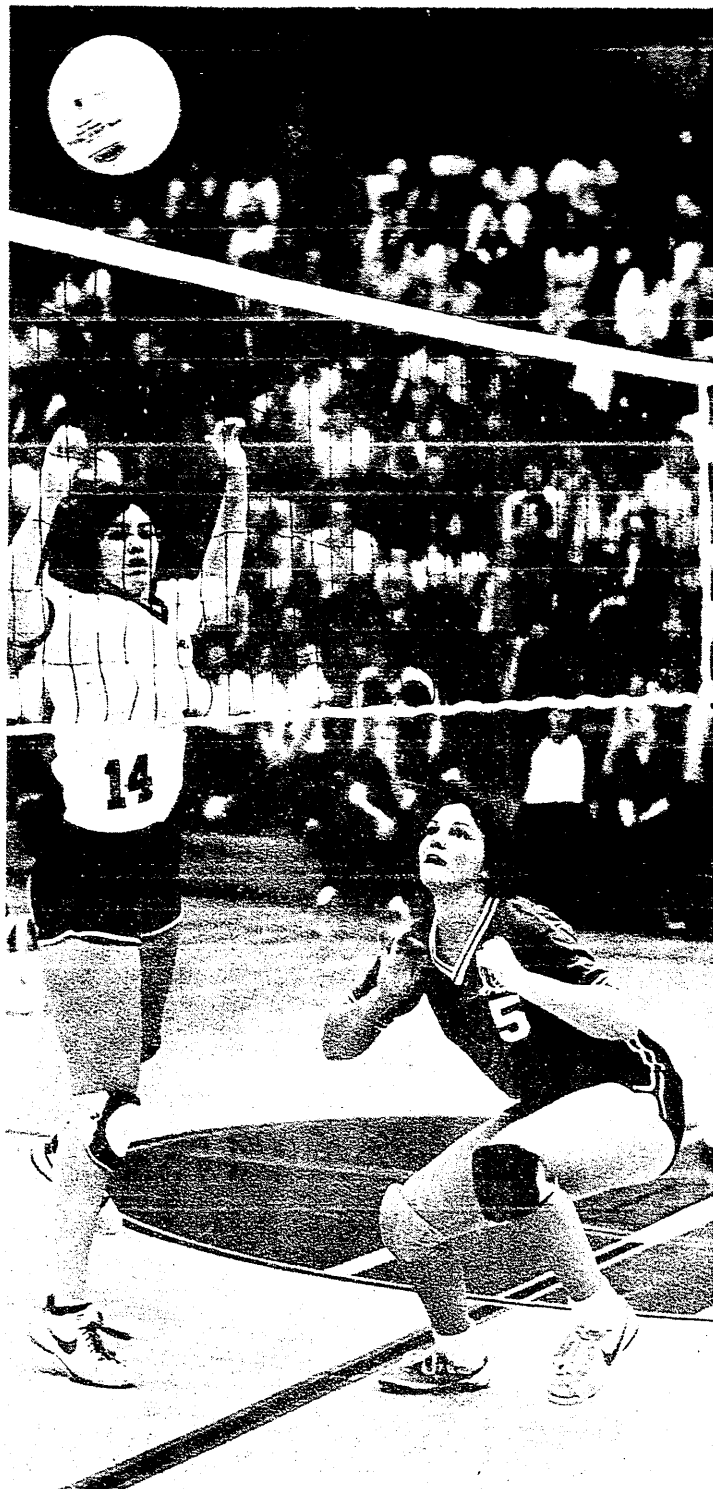

## In volleyball Cleland sparks Metro past State all-stars

Michele Cleland can concentrate on track and field now that she has completed her volleyball career.

The former Sandy High School star scored 12 points Wednesday night as she sparked the Metro all-stars to a come-from-behind 12-15, 7-15, 15-5, 15-13, 16-14 victory over the State's top volleyball players at Jackson High School.

Cleland finished second to Milwaukie's Brenda Gilbertson in scoring. Gilbertson, Cleland's teammate, tallied 19 points.

Cleland, who'll attend Oregon State University on a track and field scholarship this fall, said the Metro won because it worked better as a team.

"Our passes were bad in the early games and that hurt us," said Cleland. "But we put everything together in the closing games."

Cleland said despite the fact that the Metro had only a few practice sessions, it performed like a seasoned high school unit.

"All of our players were just great. On high school teams there's only a few standouts, but on the Metro team everyone could play. After we stopped making the bad passes we had very few mixups," said Cleland.

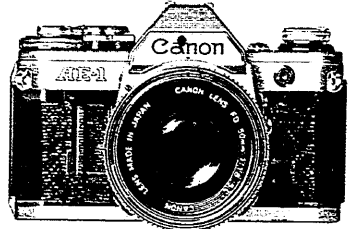
Cleland said the State players were in the net too much and went over the line a lot. That resulted in State's defeat.

"State had several good players, but not as many as we had. And in the end, we played better as a team," said Cleland.

Cleland said she was going to concentrate on getting in shape this summer for track and field. "I won't be playing collegiate volleyball at OSU. I wish I could, but from here on out, it'll be only track for me," said Cleland, who finished second in the shot put and discus at the Class AAA state track and field meet.

Cleland will also throw the javelin at OSU.

## Saints capture top wrestling stars

After wrestling with the problem for the last four years, Mount Hood Community College mat Coach Gary Head believes he has recruited the type of athletes the Saints need to be competitive on the national level.

Heading the list of recruits is Roger Sayles, who helped guide Barlow to the Class AAA state championship last winter.

"Roger is a blue chipper that a lot of major schools were interested in landing," said Head, of the 168-pounder, who won every top prize except the state title.

Sayles won the freestyle and Greco-Roman championships, but lost a 3-1 overtime decision to Churchill's John Flora in the state title match.

Other top recruits include: Sandy's Tim Freeman, the state's runner-up in the 157-pound class; Rich Dawless, Parkrose, who was third at 178; Gresham heavyweights Warren Baker and Tom Weisenbuhler; Baker was third in the state competition, while Weisenbuhler was fourth in Greco-Roman.

Other recruits are: Bo Wilde and Chuck Lumpkin of Barlow; Steve Peterson, Gresham; Kevin Muck, Columbia; Class A 141-pound runner-up Randy Mulenburg, Joseph; Class A 106 champion George McMullen, Enterprise; Randy Nelson, Sandy; and Dave St. Clair, David Douglas.

The top transfer is John Sayles, Roger's older brother, who had problems at Oregon State University.

Rayth Buswell, former Sandy wrestler, transferred to Mount Hood from Boise State.

"I'm very excited because of the new recruits and transfers. When you line these athletes up, you can see there's a lot of talent. This is my best recruiting year

ever," said Head, who'll be starting his 11th season next fall in charge of the Saints' wrestling program.

Roger Sayles will be a member of the Oregon Cultural Exchange wrestling team that will tour Italy this summer. The team will leave June 20 for Rome.

John Sayles was also a member of the touring team last summer, and was undefeated during his five matches in Italy.

Head, who graduated from Oregon State in 1966, said competing on the national level was the reason the Saints' enjoyed a good recruiting year.

"Since wrestling is more of an individual sport, we were at a big disadvantage because we had no national tournament to compete in when we were a member of the Northwest Athletic Association of Community Colleges (Washington-based conference). Now that we're back in the Oregon Community Colleges Athletic Association, we not only have Oregon schools to wrestle, but we have a national meet to compete in," said Head.

Head said his own honesty hurt the Saints' recruiting in the past.

"We've been down the last four or five years, and it's been partly my own fault. The kids want recognition, and they couldn't get it on the national level here in the past. I had to tell a lot of good wrestlers to pursue other schools," said Head.

Head believes he has four wrestlers who can compete on the national level next winter.

"John and Roger Sayles, Buswell and Brent Lofsted (fourth in Region 18 last winter) have an excellent shot at placing in the nationals next year. I think the team can be in there nationally, too. We should make at least the top 20, maybe the top 10. Four-good wins are all it takes," pointed out Head.
