RICHMOND RESERVE BANK REDISCOUNT RATE IS RAISED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 26.—(Universal Service).—A new step calculated to check stock speculation in New York was disclosed in federal reserve board announcements today.

The Richmond Reserve Bank increased its rediscount rates from 3 1/2 percent to 4 percent late in the afternoon. This follows a similar increase in the Chicago rate Tuesday.

Additional sales of government securities totaling \$50,000,000 by the reserve banks were made today. This was a total of approximately \$188,000,000 securities sold by the system in the last three weeks, reducing the funds available for market activity.

Clang of Hammers Breaks Year-Long Solitude When Fairgrounds Takes Life

The solitude of buildings unoccupied for almost a year is being broken this week in the erection of an image of all Florida, known widely as the 1928 South Florida Fair. Every hour in these buildings and on the acres of fairgrounds the picture that hundreds of thousands will see next week becomes more realistic under hammers and saws and paint brushes of hundreds of workmen. It is at once a studio, a heterogeneous workshop, and a pell-mell freight house combined—and a picture of hurrying life.

One walks through a building where unnamable hulks of machinery are being slanted into place by sweating workmen. Beside them others are stringing webs of brilliant, clinging, bunting, while over all is the refrain of hammers, and the fall of clattering boards, the smell of Florida pine and new paint.

In the next building soft trickle of water marks the installation of aquariums for the state fish and game exhibit, where the most delicate tracery of sea ferns and other shapes, like frost on a windowpane, tell of life under the sea. The colors of these blend softly from pale green to touches of harmonious red. A futuristic cut on a wall elings cruelly to a canopy.

Stands Already Up. The drink and "hot dog" stands already are doing business; there are hundreds of workmen to be fed. They eat, gossip with the girl behind the counter, and back to the job.

A workman brushes past the visitor with his arm full of lumber. The air is full of exclamations of industry, not always parlor talk, but good natured. "I've got grey, since I've been in this place; what did I do with that form?" comes a remark from across a partition. "She's lookin' right 'cross now, what you think?" says another with pride. "We've got to tighten this—collar; Hello, Mack." In another building a woman consults quietly with her workmen, contemplating the half-finished decorating of a booth. "Well, we must get all the paint on today; then we will start to move in."

The new stalls for the made-in-Tampa exhibits in Bize hall are almost finished in cream paint with deep blue and gold, and green curtains with golden fringe.

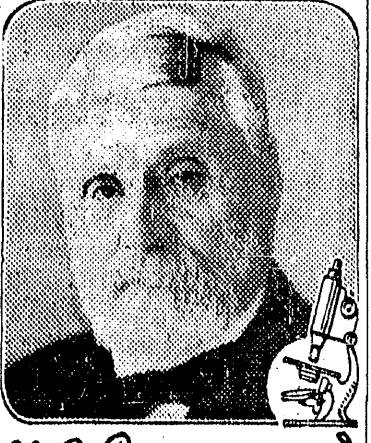
Piles of Merchandise

Aisles everywhere are piled high with merchandise and produce, and bales and boxes of decorations. One's feet catch in coils of electric cable. Big pumpkins, boxes of oranges, bales of hay, sacks of vegetables, rows of half-finished booths.

DECEMBER GASOLINE TAX RECEIPTS FOR STATE \$1,047,191

TALLAHASSEE, Jan. 26.—(A.P.)—Over a million dollars has been turned in to the state treasury by the comptroller's office on the sale of gasoline in Florida during December.

The money, amounting to \$1,047,191.48, constitutes the January collections on the 6-cent tax on gasoline sold in December. The tax was collected on 20,948,828 3-5 gallons.

Of the total received, the counties will be credited with \$208,438.99 for good roads; the state road department, \$628,314.88; the common schools will get \$139,825.56, and \$69,413.76 will be placed to the credit of the building fund for the institutions for higher learning.

The poster, pasted up by the national socialists (General Ludendorff's party), urges mass demonstrations by all unemployed war cripples, front fighters, war widows, orphans and inflation victims to "thank the new father of our country for the sweet whiplashes which international capital has been dealing out to us since 1918."

Overhauling Cars

The livestock buildings are clean, ready for their hundreds of entries. In the end of one, a half dozen racing cars are being overhauled. Experts work slowly and carefully, examining every part. There's none of the bustle of carpenters in this room.

Queer shapes of steel fabrication are being erected on the open field. Near by negroes lazily load lumber on a big truck. One hears the clatter of homes' hoofs on the dirt of the track. At one end of the field three or four tents are home for fair families. The washing flutters in the breeze. The sound of hammers and falling boards, and the smell of pine and paint come faintly on the air to this part of the field.

They say there are show fronts in this year's South Florida Fair—until in the southeast corner the fair offices are reached. Here blossom new gardens. A new fair bank is being built, of permanent material. In the office everyone is busy. Through an inside door one is ushered to the presence of P. T. Strieder, who is boss of the whole shebang.

Carrier Inspects Stands

Jerry W. Carter, hotel commissioner, returned yesterday to Jacksonville, after having spent several days here inspecting stands at the South Florida fairgrounds where foodstuffs are to be dispensed.

The hotel commissioner was accompanied here by Jacob A. Harper, representative from Volusia county and a deputy hotel commissioner. Mr. Harper is to stay here through the fair and work in conjunction with Mrs. Ellen O. Young, and her deputy hotel commissioner. They will have charge of inspecting all meats and foodstuffs on the grounds. Inspections will be made twice a day. Mr. Carter said, and all meat or other foodstuffs found contaminated in any way will be destroyed with care.

MARJORIE PARK TO BE BEAUTIFIED

Immediate improvement of Marjorie park on Davis Islands into one of the most beautiful municipal recreation centers in Tampa was ordered yesterday after a conference attended by Dr. W. M. Rowlett, chairman of the park board, R. B. True, in charge of park beautification, and Mayor McKay. Investigation of park funds has revealed frequent transfers from the Marjorie park budget to improve other parks, but money will be provided to finance the beautification of the area adjacent to the municipal hospital.

SURGEON DIES AT MEETING HERE

Dr. C. T. Nolan of Marietta Succumbs to Heart Attack

Dr. C. T. Nolan, 56, of Marietta, Ga., who was in Tampa to attend the sectional meeting of the American College of Surgeons, died yesterday following an attack of angina pectoris.

Dr. Nolan had been the first registrant at the meeting of the surgeons at the Tampa Bay hotel. A few minutes after registering, he was seized with a heart attack, which led to his death three hours later.

The body was sent to the home for burial. Dr. Nolan was recognized as one of the foremost surgeons of Georgia and was the founder of Nolan's sanitarium in Marietta. For many years he had served as a member of the state board of medical examiners. According to information from Marietta, he apparently was in the best of health when he left for Tampa.

A son, Thomas Nolan, was preparing to board a train for Tampa upon receiving word that his father was ill, when a second telegram conveyed the information that he was dead.

EXPERT MAY BE SELECTED TODAY IN FREIGHT FIGHT

A traffic expert to represent the Tampa Board of Trade in a future hearing before the interstate commerce commission in an endeavor to make permanent a suspension of freight rates to Tampa granted by the commission Jan. 14 may, possibly, be appointed this afternoon.

The matter will be discussed by a committee named Wednesday at a meeting of the board of governors of the board of trade, of which President D. B. McKay, president of the board of trade, is chairman. Other members from the board of governors are: Frank D. Jackson, V. V. Sharpe, J. A. Griffin and Dr. L. A. Bize. W. L. Waring represents the Manufacturers association.

Another son and daughter also survive. The death of Dr. Nolan was a shock to surgeons in session here, many of whom had been his lifelong friends. At a meeting of fellows of the American College of Surgeons yesterday afternoon a resolution was adopted expressing sympathy and condolence to the family of Dr. Nolan.

The club approved a plan proposed by the President's Round Table club to place sign boards bearing the names of all service clubs on roads entering the city.
