**SERVICES AT ST. JOHN'S**  
Two special services, which should be an inspiration to all who attend, have been arranged for St. John's church on Sunday. The first service, for both adults and children, will be held at 10:30 o'clock instead of 11 o'clock. Use a tin or wooden box when mailing flowers. Line the box with soft paper, and use bubble paper, avoiding any pressure on them. Sprinkle flowers with water, cover with oiled paper and adjust the lid.

Coarse salt poured into the coffee holder of the percolator before scrubbing inside and out with a brush will clean out all holes that are clogged up. Hold the coffee holder upright; hot water spigot and wash coffee deposit and salt away together.
