NEW YORK, Feb. 21.—One-third of the Armenian race either has been massacred or has died from starvation and disease since the European war began, and one-half of those remaining are homeless and dying in exile, according to a cable message from John Masefield, English writer, made public here tonight by the American Committee for Armenian and Syrian Relief. The message said in part:
