CHILDREN'S CLOTHES SALE

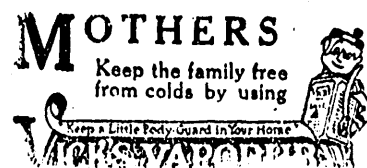

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Sub-committee Reports FAVORABLY ON THE BILL FOR ADDITIONAL JUDGE The bill providing an additional Federal judge in the Southern District of Florida, which has passed the senate and which has been in the hands of a sub-committee of the house judiciary committee has been favorably reported to the committee by the sub-committee according to a telegram received yesterday from Congressman W. J. Rees by Judge William Hunter, president of the Florida State Bar Association. The bill will be reported on by the judiciary committee, undoubtedly as the sub-committee reported, and go to the house for final action where it is confidently believed it will have easy sailing. Under the law the new judge will have his residence at Tampa and the work of the judiciary will be divided up between the judge of the circuit, the marshal and attorney will continue as before, the increase in criminal business before the court, not being heavy enough to justify two districts, or the full official family necessary for such.

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
