### GIVEN YEAR FOR HOLDUP ATTEMPT Only One Criminal Case Remains

John LaRue, itinerant from New York City, indicted by the January grand jury on a charge of assault with intent to commit a hold-up, yesterday afternoon pleaded guilty to assault with a deadly weapon and was sentenced in Circuit court by Judge Arthur E. Fisher to a year in the Winnebago county jail and payment of a \$100 fine.

LaRue will be credited with the time he has already spent in county jail since late in October.

Picked up in a police round-up of suspicious characters, LaRue was recognized by Alderman Harry Leach as the man who accosted him on Cedar street between South Winnebago and South Court streets on the night of Oct. 16 with the command to "stick 'em up."

Because LaRue did not at any time ask for Alderman Leach's possessions or money and made no attempt to get them when the Rockford alderman walked away from him, without surrendering anything, the state's attorney's office here decided to let LaRue plead guilty of assault with a deadly weapon.

The only criminal case remaining to be heard during the current term of Circuit court is the charge made by the state against Mrs. Leona Young, indicted on a charge of stealing an automobile. She will go on trial next Tuesday morning.

### Durand Estate Goes To Son At Beloit

A son, Robert H. Yale of Beloit, Wis., is the only heir to a \$23,000 estate left by the late James W. Yale of Durand, according to a petition for letters of administration filed yesterday with Probate Clerk Charles F. Brown at the court house here.

The Yale estate is listed as consisting of \$3,000 in personal property and \$20,000 in real estate.

The petition was filed by Attorney William D. Knight in behalf of the Beloit heir.

### 2 Divorce Decrees

Two divorces were granted yesterday afternoon by Circuit Judge Arthur E. Fisher.

Mabel Peterson was granted a divorce from her husband, Connie A. Peterson, on the grounds of desertion by the husband. She was represented by the law firm of Large and Reno.

In the divorce suit of Ovid Hogan versus Helen Hogan, the defendant was granted the divorce on grounds of cruelty. Mrs. Hogan was represented by Attorney Frank Maynard while the husband was represented by Attorney Charles A. Thomas.

### Jury Awards Mauff \$10,000 For Services

Chicago, Feb. 2.—(AP)—Arthur W. Cutten's ghost writer in a propaganda campaign for less government regulation of grain trading was awarded a \$10,000 judgment today for services rendered.

John R. Mauff, former secretary and director of the Chicago Board of Trade and Cutten's bosom friend and neighbor for years, had asked \$50,000 but expressed satisfaction with the verdict of the Circuit court jury.

He had testified he wrote articles and radio script under the name of wheat pit, and in letters and conferences with former Secretary of Agriculture Arthur M. Hyde, former Presidents Coolidge and Hoover and several United States senators had sought in Cutten's behalf to have the federal rules affecting grain futures speculation relaxed.

Cutten acknowledged the good work done by Mauff but in defense of the latter's \$50,000 claim said he had never promised any remuneration. He and Mauff, Cutten told the jury, thought alike on the problems of the wheat trader and they were just "partners in propaganda," interested alike in amendment of the grain futures act to give the buyer of futures a little more rein.
