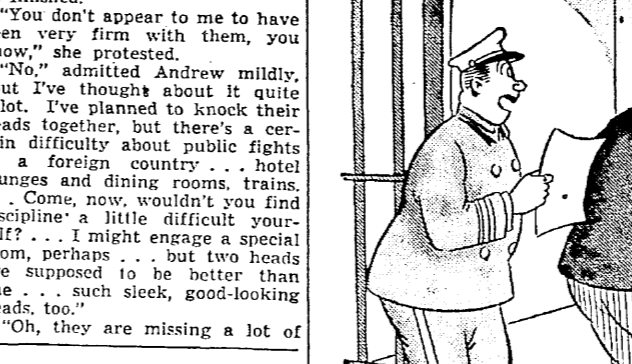
Y BOYS CLUBS Plans Made For Trip To 2nd Congress

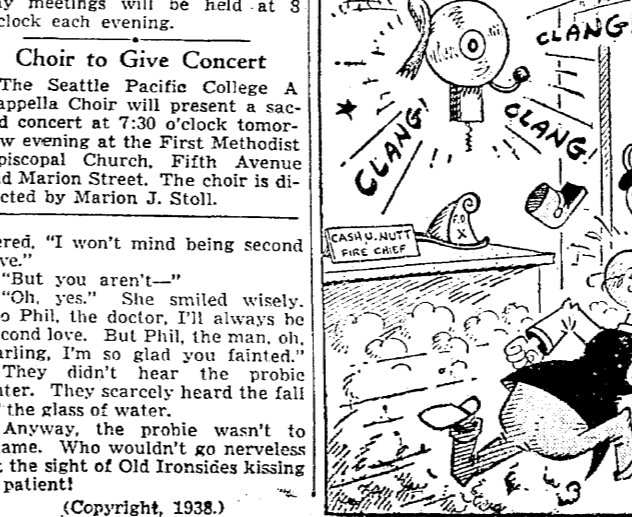
