25 BRAVE SUFFRAGETTES START 140-MILE 'HIKE' FOR THE CAUSE

Grease Boots, Soap Feet, Pull On Stockings and Start From New York With Petition to Governor Sulzer at Albany.

New York, Dec. 16.—First aid is all right for our small brutes, but nothing will cure us but votes for all. Thus sang twenty-five suffragettes as they started on their 140-mile walk to Albany to deliver to Governor Sulzer on his inauguration day a message for the cause of woman suffrage.

Clad in sweaters, mackinaws, short skirts and high boots, and headed by a woman bearing a martial banner on a snar drum, the marchers left Van Cortlandt park on the outskirts of the city shortly after 9 o'clock.

COUNCIL NO RIGHT TO ORDER OFFICER TO ABATE NUISANCE

If Place Is Destroyed, Owner May Collect Full Damages.

APPEALS COURT RULING

Judges Cunningham and Morgan Dissent in Canon City Case.

The court of appeals this morning decided that where a city council declares a liquor place a nuisance and the town marshal and his aides abate it by wrecking the place, the owner can collect damages.

Judges Cunningham and Morgan dissented from this opinion and Judge Cunningham severely criticized the law and sarcastically referred to the owner of the "joint" that was the basis for the decision.

The lower court is sustained, the appellate court holding that while the city is authorized to declare a nuisance, it had no right to order its abatement and had not ordered the wrecking of the place.

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HILL'S OFFER TO BRING INDIANS TO PAGEANT BRINGS ENTHUSIASM

Members of Publicity League Confident Railroad Magnate's Co-operation Will Insure Success--Renewed Interest.

Louis W. Hill's magnificent offer to bring a whole tribe of Blackfoot Indians to Denver and to maintain them during the Pageant of America aroused the members of the Colorado Publicity league as nothing else has done.

That the league has won the support of neighboring towns and that these will take a prominent part in developing the Pageant of America is proved by two communications which have come to Gordon Jones, chairman of the advisory committee.

One of these was from Idaho Springs, the Commercial club of which unofficially announced that in the event the league established the beacon on the Indian mountain, as has been suggested, a fund of \$50,000 will be raised and given to the league for such use as its officers deem best.

Plans have been informally discussed for the erection of this beacon, and E. E. Tompkins, who originated the idea, declared it will be possible to throw a stream of blazing gasoline 1000 feet in the air.

The Denver & Inter-Mountain railroad runs within four miles of the town and is a mile of the entrance to Mount Vernon canon, which is half way between Morrison and Golden, and at slight expense could be extended so as to cover the entire section.
