

THE MANIKER CASE.

The Jury Could Not Agree and Another Jury Was Summoned.

Newport, Ark., Feb. 2.—After 42 hours of weary watching and waiting, Judge Butler discharged the jury in the case of Albert Maniker at noon to-day and ordered the Sheriff to summon a new venire from which to select a new jury to try this important case over again. At 8 o'clock this evening only one man was accepted for the new jury. The discharged jury stood 10 for murder in the first degree and 2 for 21 years in the penitentiary. The Republic correspondent learned from the two for murder in the second degree that they were not quite sure beyond a doubt that the bullet that killed Conductor McNally was fired by someone of the robbers. One of them advanced the ridiculous and improbable theory that the brave conductor who died at his post shot himself accidentally.
