Science Seeks To Control Climate

WASHINGTON, Feb. 23-Half the United States has just experienced one of its most violent cold waves. Snow, ice and gale-force winds caused the death or hospitalization of hundreds property damage mounted to the millions; entire cities were isolated from the rest

of the country.
The disaster stories will not abate this spring, when the tornado and flood season begins. Then will come the summer droughts and the autumn hurricanes from the Atlantic. These whims of weather have been suffered by mankind since history began.

Today, science is finding out whether we must continue to suffer them. Experiments indicate we may be wo other men, were talking on the threshold of a new with Fangio at the time.

Editor's Note: Scientists are seeking to control the weather on a worldwide basis. If they are successful, there will be spectacular changes in global living conditions. This, the first of five articles, details the beginning of this new era, and the knowns and unknowns of weather control.

The theory of global weather control is based in part on some radical and still not completely proved hypoth-

Some of these hypotheses

1. That temperatures of various parts of the earth might be raised or lowered by varying the amount of heat which the sun delivers to the face of the earth.

2. That man-made electric currents or artificially induced magnetic fields might be used to start, stop and even steer violent storms

3. That by changing the course of ocean currents by means of huge dams and powerful atomic - driven pumps the lands of the frozen north could be made to bloom again.

Some of the hypotheses are based in part on the study of so-called "storms," the like of which have never been seen on the surface of the earth.

They are ionospheric storms which appear to rage a hundred or more miles above the earth with "winds" of up to 1,000 miles an hour; and subterranean storms which, according to some theories, cause poweruid currents to surge about the earth, 2.000 miles underground.

The late Dr. Irving Langmuir, one of the fathers of modern theories of weather control, was convinced that the atmosphere of the world is somehow in such a delicate state of balance that the release of rainfall by cloud-seeding or other artificial means at one point in the world produces profound consequences in other parts of the world.

Although Langmuir was a Nobel Prize winner, his theory met great resistance. Government agencies were unwilling to accept the political and economic implications of a theory which plainly stated that experiments carried on within the boundaries of one nation (Continued on a-3, Col. 4)
