

John F. MacLane, Noted Attorney, Succumbs At 79

John F. MacLane, 79, of 7910 Prospect Pl., La Jolla, once a senior partner in one of the nation's largest law firms, died Sunday at his home.

The MacLanes, who had been wintering in La Jolla for many years, moved there permanently from Connecticut seven months ago.

He was senior partner of Simpson, Thacher and Bartlett, New York City, when he retired in 1953. He joined the firm in 1929.

MacLane codified laws for the state of Idaho in 1909 and later founded a law firm with William E. Borah, later senator from Idaho.

He was special counsel to the U.S. Government in federal trade investigations from 1926 to 1929. He was also general counsel for Electric Bond & Share, a holding company, at one time.

He was born in Ohio, was graduated from Yale University and received his law degree from University of Minnesota Law School.

He is survived by his widow, Margaret L., and a daughter and two grandchildren elsewhere.

Private services will be at 2 p.m. today at La Jolla Mortuary.
